Dear Mr. Minton:

Pursuant to your request, I have reviewed the medical records, post-mortem protocol, photographs, and other relevant documents regarding the post-conviction appeal of Mr. Philip R. Workman.

CLINICAL SUMMARY:

During the evening of August 5, 1981, Mr. Philip R. Workman robbed a Wendy's Restaurant. Memphis Police Officers Ronald D. Cliver and Aubrey K. Stoddard arrived at the scene first, and Police Officer Parker arrived soon thereafter. Although the actual events are unclear, it appears that as Mr. Workman was leaving the restaurant, he became involved in a physical altercation with Officers Oliver and Stoddard. During that scuffle, Mr. Workman received multiple abrasions and lacerations to his head. He shot Officer Stoddard in the arm, and he was then shot by Officer Parker, who used a shotgun. At some point during this altercation, Officer Oliver received a through-and-through gunshot wound of the chest.

Officer Oliver was transported to the Emergency Room of The City of Memphis Hospital. A left lateral thoracotomy was performed by Santiago Vera, M.D., who found a large amount of blood in the left chest cavity, perforation of the pericardium, and a large laceration of the posterior wall of

the left ventricle. Due to the extensive trauma and the fact that Officer Oliver arrived at the hospital without vital signs, no surgical repair was attempted, and he was declared dead at 10:55 P.M., on August 5, 1981.

An autopsy was performed by Drs. Francisco, Bell, and Harlan, apparently at The City of Memphis Hospital, on August 6th, at 11:30 A.M. The autopsy protocol revealed that they found a gurshot wound of the lateral left chest in the midaxillary line, 52 inches above the heel. The wound was fairly circular, and measured 50/100 of an inch in diameter, with an abrasion at its superior aspect. The bullet perforated the skin and soft tissues of the left lateral chest, fractured the left 7th rib (anterior axillary line), perforated the pleura in the left 7th-8th intercostal space, perforated the left lung at the lower lobe lateral inferior margin, left diaphragm, stomach, cardiac diaphragm, heart (left ventricle, $3 \times 4 \text{ cm.}$, and mitral valve and left acrium, $5 \times 6 \text{ cm.}$), lower lobe of the right lung, and then perforated the pleura in the right 5th-5th intercostal space around the mid-axillary line. The bullet then perforated the soft tissues and skin of the right upper posterior back, 53-1/2 inches above the heel, where it exited. This wound measured 21/100 of an inch x 64/100 of an inch, and was slit-like. However, in his testimony, Dr. Bell said that the wound was $21/100 \times 24/100$ of an inch. The autopsy diagram depicts the entrance wound to be markedly larger in area than the exit wound. The trajectory of the bullet was described as left to right, inferior to superior, and anterior to posterior. The left lateral thoracotomy was sutured. There were bilateral hemothoraces, wich 50 cc. remaining in the left and 700 cc. in the right. There was 50 cc. of blood in the peritoneal cavity. kidneys were pale and opaque, with swollen cortex and congested medulla, suggestive of shock kidney. Other findings were atherosclerosis of the coronary arteries and aorta, aorasions of the face/forehead, right forearm and hand, and contusions and scars of the skin. Microscopic examination of the autopsy tissue slides was essentially set forth in the gross examination. Toxicological tests did not reveal any foreign substances in the blood or bile. indication that an x-ray of the chest was performed, or that There was no any bullet fragments were found sither at the hospital or at autopsy,

In Mr. Workman's trial, the jury found him guilty of first-degree felony murder of Officer Oliver, and he was sentenced to death. Me remains on death row today. The most important part of the trial apparently was the testimony of Officers Stoddard and Parker, who stated that they never fired their weapons, although the records and other witnesses indicated that they did. These records and witness statements do not appear to have been raised during the trial. Based on the two officers' testimony, the prosecution set forth that only Mr. Workman could have fired the fatal shot. Nobody presented any findings to contradict this argument, which was based on the wounds and the gun and ammunition found. Also, there was some question whether the only witness who stated that Mr. Workman shot Officer Oliver was really even outside the Wendy's Restaurant at that time.

Mr. Gerald Wilkes, a firearms expert for the FBI, testified during Mr. Workman's trial that he received a package from Lieutenant Barney Wright of the Memphis Police Department on August 17, 1981. It contained a discharged bullet, a fragment of a bullet jacket, a metal fragment, three cartridge cases, a shirt, a .45 caliber gun and bullet with a cartridge that had not been fired. The gun was a .45 auto caliber pistol, model Commander, manufactured by the Colt Firearm Company. Mr. Wilkes determined that the discharged Mr. Wilkes determined that the discharged bullet, jacket fragment, and three cartridges all came from the pistol. Since there were no special markings on the metal fragment, no conclusions as to its origin could be made. The bullet was described to be an aluminum jacketed, soft lead core, hollow-point bullet, which appeared to have minimal deformation. Mr. Wilkes did say he would usually expect more deformation of a bullet, but seemed to imply that it was not necessary unless the bullet had hit cone. I could not find anywhere in the testimony that Mr. Wilkes was aware that the bullet had fractured the left 7th rib as it entered Officer Oliver's body. From his testimony, I can find no evidence that he found any tissue, blood, or fabric on the bullet or jacket fragment to link them to Officer Oliver. Mr. Wilkes also analyzed the shirt, but could not see any unburned or partially burned powder around either wound, microscopically or chemically.

Kris Sperry, M.D., Deputy Chief Medical Examiner for the Fulton County Medical Examiner's Office in Atlanta, Georgia,

had previously given an opinion in this case. He stated that during his career, he has been involved in approximately 30 to 40 autopsies where the gunshot wounds were due to ammunition like Mr. Workman fired. In approximately 90% of those cases, the bullet did not exit the body, and in the other 16%, the exit wound was significantly larger than the entrance wound. Even though in this case, the exit wound was smaller than the entrance wound, and Dr. Sperry stated he had never seen this, the Court hearing Mr. Workman's appeal discounted his testimony because it did not unconditionally state that Mr. Workman's ammunition could not have caused Officer Oliver's In either the same or another appeal, the panel Wounds. hearing arguments introduced their own evidence. They used a paper by Martin L. Fackler, M.D., in which he stated that high-velocity NATO 7.52 mm., soft-point, rifle bullets regularly shed small fragments upon impact. Thus, since the bullet fragmented, then only a fragment exited the back, and the rest of the bullet must have remained in the body and was In his testimony at the original trial, Mr. Wilkes described the ammunition as that of a .45 caliber pistol, not a rifle. In test firings, this pistol did not fire at high velocity, but rather at or below 1000 ft./sec.

I have examined the photographs, but due to their poor quality, lack of close-up shots, and the absence of rulers to allow the size of the wounds to be estimated, I cannot make any comments about them.

MEDICOLEGAL OUESTIONS:

1. Is it likely that Officer Oliver's gunshot wounds were caused by Mr. Workman's ammunition?

No, I do not believe it is likely. The autopsy revealed a through-and-through gunshot wound of the chest, with a fracture of the left 7th rib and a single path through the body. The gunshot wound of entrance in the left lateral chest was significantly larger than the gunshot wound of exit in the right upper posterolateral back.

In my experience, I have found that hollow-point bullets fired out of low-velocity guns versus high-velocity rifles generally do not exit the body, as they mushroom or flatter out while passing through the tissues of the body. On the

rare occasion when the bullet exits, it creates a wound larger than that of the entrance wound due to the deformity of the In this case, if the bullet going through Officer bullet. Oliver's body was a hollow-point, it would have deformed on impacting the rib and fracturing it. I do not believe it would then have been able to exit the body, since it would have lost its kinetic energy too quickly to cross the entire width of the body, and also have created the extensive damage to all the various organs and tissues found at autopsy. It is well-known that upon hitting bone, hollow-point bullets may fragment. However, in doing so, they lose a significant amount of energy. Therefore, it would not be conceivable that smaller fragments would cross the width of the body while creating the trauma found along the pathway. Such fragments would not have enough kinetic energy to do so. Also, if a bony fragment was broken off by the bullet, it also would not have the energy to cross the width of the body. Even if the bullet had fragmented or created bony fragments, I have never seen any cases in which all these fragments could cross the width of the body and stay together. Thus, if fragmentation did happen, there would have had to be at least more than one missile path part way through the body. No additional or separate pathway was described in the autopsy report.

2. Is it possible to determine what type of ammunition the entrance wound would be consistent with?

No, it is not. As I have stated, the wounds in this case are not consistent with hollow-point amounition fired at low velocity. In my experience, it is not possible to precisely determine the caliber of a bullet based on the size of the entrance wound in the skin due to the elasticity of the skin and the varying consistency of the underlying tissue. If a bullet perforates firm tissue, such as bone or cartilage, without destroying it, the bullet would leave a hole that is quite near the size of that bullet. Thus, the caliber could be determined, provided the bullet had not been deformed prior to perforating such firm tissue. In this case, the bullet fractured a rib; it did not merely perforate the rib. Therefore, no hole was formed that could be measured to make a valid determination concerning the caliber of the bullet.

In the textbook, <u>Gunshot Wounds</u>, by Vincent J.M. DiMaio, M.D. (1993), the author writes - "The caliber of the bullet

that caused an entrance wound cannot be determined by the diameter of the entrance. A .38 caliber bullet can produce a hole having the diameter of a .32 caliber bullet and vice versa. The size of the hole is due not only to the diameter of the bullet but also to the elasticity of the skin and the location of the wound. An entrance wound in an area where the skin is tightly stretched will have a diameter different from that of a wound in an area where the skin is lax."

3. Is it possible from the material provided to determine if the exit wound was made by a bullet fragment or main bullet mass that shed fragments? Could it be due to something else?

The presence of a single pathway across the width of the body negates the argument that the bullet fragmented, or that a bony fragment was formed which then exited. Since no fragments were found at the rib fracture site or in the blood within the left chest cavity, either during the laparotomy or at autopsy, then a second path would have had to be created if the bullet fragmented. This was not found. Therefore, the only explanation is that the bullet which entered Officer Cliver deformed somewhat upon fracturing the rib without flattening out, and then continued across the body to exit in one piece.

The paper the Court cited showed that high-velocity, power rifle bullets may shed fragments as they travel through the body. However, this is not a characteristic of lower velocity pistol or revolver bullets. As it does not appear that anyone involved in this altercation was using a rifle, nor were metal fragments found in the tissues and organs examined, I cannot find anything to support the hypothesis that the bullet which traveled through Officer Oliver's body shed fragments along the way.

4. Does the exit wound give an indication as to the caliber of the bullet?

No, it would not for the same reasons given as to why the entrance wound in the skin cannot be used to determine the caliber of the bullet. Furthermore, in this case, the bullet would have been deformed, at least partially, upon fracturing

the rib, so that the exit wound produced would have been further distorted.

5. Should an x-ray have been taken in this case?

In my experience, in dealing with a gunshot wound case of this nature, an x-ray should be taken to rule out the presence of any portion of the bullet that may have been left in the body. However, as I have pointed out above, I do not feel that an x-ray would have found any bullet fragments in this case. There was only one bullet path across the width of the body. The laparotomy and autopsy failed to find any bullet fragments around the fractured rib or within the blood in the left chest cavity. This clearly indicates that the bullet traveled through the body and exited intact.

OPINION:

After completion of my evaluation and analysis of all the materials, it is my professional opinion, based upon a reasonable degree of medical certainty, that the gunshot wound of Police Officer Ronald B. Oliver is not consistent with the type of ammunition used by Mr. Philip R. Workman, namely, a low-velocity, .45 caliber, aluminum jacketed, hollow-point bullet. I do believe that Officer Oliver died from a throughand-through gunshot wound, with the exit wound smaller than the entrance wound, and only a single pathway present in the body. Therefore, based on the path that the bullet took, the fact that the bullet exited the body, and the fact that Mr. Workman was using a .45 caliber pistol loaded with aluminum jacketed, hollow-point bullets, I do not believe that it was Mr. Workman's gun that fired the shot that fatally wounded Officer Oliver.
