Annual Juvenile Court Statistical Report Executive Summary

2006 DATA LIMITATIONS

The AOC was able to collect more complete juvenile court data in 2006 than they have in the past; however, please note that data from 2005 has not been included in the trend information charts. In 2005, one of the larger juvenile courts submitted their data in a summarized format which could not be included in the database. The lack of data from this court would have skewed the data giving a false representation of juvenile trend factors within the State. To overcome this challenge, the AOC chose the trend range of 1996 through 2004 and 2006, allowing for 10 years of accumulated facts that present the juvenile court data in the most meaningful way.

The Tennessee Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges (TCJFCJ), was created by the Tennessee General Assembly through legislation that was effective July 1, 1982. The TCJFCJ is the official organization of Tennessee judges having juvenile court jurisdiction. Throughout its history the Council has represented juvenile court judges and court staff, providing an independent voice regarding issues affecting children, youth, families and communities. The juvenile courts and the clerks of the courts provide juvenile court data as set out in the Tennessee Code Annotated § 37-1-506. The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) assumed administrative support responsibility for the TCJFCJ in April 2005. The report for calendar year 2006 marks the third TCJFCJ annual report published by the AOC. REFERRAL INFORMATION

In the 2006 calendar year, there were a total of **161,631** referrals to juvenile courts involving **87,081** children and resulting in **242,216** dispositions in Tennessee.

The reader should note that the definition of case is as follows: "All referral reasons/charges reported to the court (via complaint, petition, motion, etc.) on a given day for a given child." It is also important to be aware that the juvenile data is counted based on the date of disposition. This is the date that the case is disposed or adjudicated by the juvenile court and then reported to the TCJFCJ during calendar year 2006.

Over one third of the children referred (37.6%) were from the four metropolitan areas of Shelby/Memphis (14,205), Davidson/Nashville (8,528), Knox/Knoxville (6,027), and Hamilton/Chattanooga (4,003).

Delinquent referrals (78,612) accounted for nearly half of all referrals at 48.6%. White males in the delinquent category total 33,762 and represent 42.9% of the juvenile court population with delinquent referrals 78,612 outnumbering their female counterparts who total 13,856 and are 17.6% of the juvenile population with delinquent referrals. African American males in the delinquent category total 20,539 and represent 26.1% of the juvenile population with delinquent referrals outnumbering their female counterparts who total 7,405 and represent 9.4% of the juvenile population with delinquent referrals.

REFERRALS BY AGE AND RACE

The 2006 data indicated that nearly one third **(33.3%)** of the referrals were for 15 and 16 year olds. White males represented the greatest number of those referrals in this age category totaling **21,828**, or **40.6%** of the juvenile court population in the 15 through 16 years of age category and outnumbering their female counterparts who totaled **11,830** representing **22.0%** of juveniles in this age category. African American males represented the second largest number of referrals in the 15 through 16 years of age category totaling **12,390** or **23.0%** and outnumbering their female counterparts who totaled **5,527** or **10.3%** of the juveniles in this age category.

MINORITY REFERRALS

The immigrant population in Tennessee has increased so much that the juvenile courts have found that there has been a corresponding increase in the number of juveniles of different nationalities and races coming before them. The courts have asked that the racial categories be expanded to reflect individuals of Middle Eastern descent, for example, who are now being classified as White, African American, or Asian as there is no accurate category in which to report these statistics except as noted. The federal standard states that these juveniles would be included in the White category, but the courts would like the statistics to reflect the juvenile population in their jurisdiction more definitively so they can identify areas of need for resource allocation and intervention practices.

LIVING ARRANGEMENTS

At the time of their referral to juvenile court, only **15.4%** of all Tennessee children referred were living with both biological parents. Consistent with the data gathered in previous years, the Living Arrangement of Juveniles by Race and Sex for CY 2006 data shows that within the general juvenile court population **(87,081)**, the highest number of children, **(33,283)** were reported to be living "With Mother" at the time of referral to juvenile court. This is **38.2%** of the total of all children referred. The second and third most reported living arrangements for the general juvenile court population were "Unknown" **13,595** or **15.6%** and "With both Biological Parents" **13,375** or **15.4%**.

SCHOOL STATUS

Almost 65%, of the juvenile court population, were reported as being "Enrolled" in school either full or part-time at the time of referral. School enrollment was listed as "Unknown" for nearly **23%** of the juvenile court population.

In 2006, a majority **(64.5%)** of the juvenile court population **(87,081)** were reported as being "Enrolled" in school either full or part-time at the time of referral to juvenile court. **12.8%** were reported as "Not Enrolled" in school. The "Not Enrolled" in school category also included those children who had been expelled. It should be noted that school enrollment for **19,803** or **22.7%** of the juvenile court population was reported as "Unknown".

3,052 or **3.5%** of the general juvenile court population was reported as being enrolled in a special education curriculum at the time of referral. **53,447** or **61.4%** of the juvenile court population were reported as "Not Enrolled" in a special education curriculum and the special education status of **30,582** children, or **35.1%** of this same population was reported as "Unknown".

REFERRAL DISPOSAL INFORMATION

Information regarding **161,631** referrals disposed of by Tennessee juvenile courts was reported in 2006. Nearly half **(48.6%)** of the 2006 referral reasons disposed of by juvenile courts fell into the category of alleged Delinquent offenses. Status offenses represented **15.7%** of the total referral reasons reported to the juvenile court, while Non-offense referral reasons comprised an additional **35.6%** of the total.

The 2006 data showed the most commonly reported delinquent referral reasons to be "Traffic", **(18,941)** "Assault" **(7,777)**, "Theft of Property" **(6,798)**, "Violation of Probation" **(6,274)**, "Disorderly Conduct" **(6,217)**, and "Possession of Controlled Substances" **(4,384)**. The most often reported status offense referral reasons were "Truancy" **(7,312)**, "Unruly Behavior" **(5,985)**, "Possession of Tobacco Products" **(4,250)**, "In-state Runaway" **(3,485)**, "Violation of Curfew" **(2,759)**, and "Violation of a Valid Court Order" **(1,524)**.

"Child Support" (10,261), "Dependency and Neglect" (9,315), "Custody" (8,566), "Judicial Review" (7,909) and "Foster Care Review" (3,579) are the most prevalent within the non-offense category.

REFERRAL SOURCE

Anyone who perceives a need for the juvenile court to intervene in a child's affairs can refer that child to the juvenile court. Frequently, the referral source is closely related to the reason for referral. For example, schools refer truants and law enforcement officers refer children who have committed illegal acts.

As the Source of Referrals by Race and Sex for CY 2006 table and chart show, "Law Enforcement" was the referral source most often cited at **46.8%**, "Parents" were the second at **10.5%**, and the "Department of Children's Services"(DCS) was the third at **10.1%**. "Court Staff" at **8.5%**, was the fourth most often cited referral source and "School" at **6.6%**, was the fifth.

SIX MOST FREQUENT REFERRAL REASONS BY SOURCE IN 2006

When looking at the six (6) most frequently reported referral reasons associated with each referral source in 2006, law enforcement personnel most often referred juveniles for traffic complaints, while custody was the reason most often cited for referral by parents and relatives. Self referrals, referrals by community service agencies, other state departments, child and parent, and the District Attorney all had child support issues at the top. With regard to schools, truancy remained the most cited referral reason and possession of tobacco products was the second. Most DCS and social agency referrals were for dependency and neglect issues. Victims continued to refer most often for assault and hospitals referred most often for paternity and legitimation.

WEAPONS REFERRALS

2006 data shows that of the total children referred **(860)** for Unlawful Possession/Carrying of a Weapon, the largest percentages by age were: **37.1%** age 17, **27.0%** age 16, and **17.7%** age 15. The percentages of children referred for this reason by race and gender were: **61.2%** African American males, **27.0%** white males, **5.0%** African American females, and **1.7%** white females.

Five hundred and forty two (542) children were referred for Carrying Weapons on School Property with eighty-four percent of those referrals for ages 13 through 17. The percentages of children referred for this reason by race and gender in 2006 were as follows: **41.3%** African American males, **30.8%** white males, **17.3%** African American females, and **5.7%** white females.

INTAKE ACTIONS AT REFERRAL

2006 data shows that petitions were filed in **65.8%** of the 2006 referrals and motions were filed in **4.4%**. These figures reflect the number of petitions or motions that resulted in judicial action of some kind. Petitions that were filed but ended in an informal adjustment are explained later in this report.

Citations, which law enforcement may use in lieu of a petition, were issued in **12.8%** of the referrals, paternity actions accounted for **.05%**, and judicial, administrative and foster care reviews accounted for **5.5%**.

DETENTION INFORMATION

One of the immediate decisions the court must make after receiving an offenserelated referral is whether or not to detain the child. When the court believes that a child referred for offense-related reasons is in need of protection or may be a threat to the community, the court may elect to detain the child.

2006 detention statistics revealed that of the children referred **(87,081)** percentages fell into the following categories: **9.2%** in the "Juvenile Detention Facility", **1.7%** in "Other", and **.9%** in "Non-secure Placement". The data also shows that **66.8%** of the children referred were in the "Does Not Apply" category because they were not considered for detention.

DISPOSITIONAL PROCEDURES

After a referral is made to the juvenile court, decisions are made regarding how the court will proceed. If the decision is made to handle the referral informally, two options are open to the court: pretrial diversion and informal adjustment. These two procedures are quite similar in that they are both a voluntary agreement between the court officer, the child, and the parents that address the problem but avoid a formal court hearing and an official finding of guilt. The difference between pretrial diversion and informal adjustment is in the extent to which the judge or referee is involved. Pretrial diversion requires judicial approval of the voluntary agreement. Informal adjustment is subject to judicial approval, but does not require it prior to initiation. 2006 disposition procedures information reveals that **16.2%** of all the referrals to juvenile court were handled by informal adjustment. **5.8%** of all referrals disposed by other actions were handled by pretrial diversions.

When the court believes that it is in the best interest of the child and/or the community, a formal adjudicatory proceeding or hearing is held regarding the child's referral to juvenile court. The adjudicatory hearing is a formal proceeding in which the judge or referee determines whether the motion made on behalf of the child (or the complaint made against the child) is substantiated. If substantiation of the motion/complaint occurs, a dispositional hearing must be held; this can happen either immediately or at a later date. The statistics indicate that **44.5%** of the referrals to juvenile court resulted in a formal adjudicatory proceeding. Of the formally adjudicated proceedings, **64.8%** were substantiated, **25.8%** formally dismissed and **9.4%** were retired.

NUMBER OF INDIVIDUAL CHILDREN TRANSFERRED TO ADULT COURT BY RACE AND SEX

The 2006 data was analyzed to determine the number of children transferred to adult court for alleged delinquent offenses. The data shows that **289** children were transferred to adult court in 2006. Males were the overwhelming majority of transferred children (**268**) at **92.7%**. **70.2%** of the children transferred were African American males, while their white male counterparts represented **21.5%** of the overall transfers. African American females represented **3.5%**. White females represented **2.4%** of all transfers.

This represents over three times as many delinquent African American males transferred to adult courts (203) than white males (62), despite the fact that there are nearly twice as many delinquent white males (32,391)* as there are African American males (16,220) in the general juvenile population. Delinquent African American males commit offenses listed under TCA §37-1-134 (1) at a higher rate in both frequency and percentage than delinquent white males.

The majority of these children were sixteen (16) years of age or more at the time of the alleged conduct, or the child was less than sixteen (16) years of age if such child was charged with the offense of first degree murder, second degree murder, rape, aggravated rape, rape of a child, aggravated robbery, especially aggravated robbery, kidnapping, aggravated kidnapping or especially aggravated kidnapping, or an attempt to commit any such offenses.

Juvenile Court Referrals Disposed State-wide Based on Number of Referrals

Juvenile court cases and referrals can be disposed by judges, referees, youth services officers, or probation officers. All cases resulting in a formal hearing and adjudication must be disposed by judicial staff, which includes judges, referees or special judges. Cases that are handled informally through informal adjustment or other informal, non-judicial actions can be disposed by the court officers.

The 2006 data shows that **52.2%** of all referral reasons **(161,631)** were disposed by judicial staff: **52.2%** by Judges, **32.6%** by Referees. Another **12.2%** were disposed by Youth Services/Probation Officers, and **3.0%** by Other/Not Reported.

COMPARISONS

Comparing calendar year 2006 with 2004*, the number of children referred in Tennessee dropped by one and one-half percent. This reduction can be attributed to fewer referrals in the categories of Status/Unruly and Dependency/Neglect.

*2004 data was used for comparison instead of 2005 data because not all courts were represented in the 2005 Annual Report.

Delinquent, Dependent/Neglect/Abuse, and Status/Unruly Referrals for CY 2006





Children can have referrals in multiple categories. The drawing above shows that in the year 2006 there were 71,550 individual children referred to juvenile courts in Tennessee for delinquent referrals, 18,495 for status/unruly behavior, and 9,506 for neglect, dependent or abuse referrals. Of these children there were 6,491 that had a delinquent AND a status/unruly referral. There were 388 children that were referred for delinquent behavior AND a neglect, dependent or abuse allegation. There were 246 children referred that had both a status/unruly referral AND a neglect, dependent or abuse allegation. Also, there were 183 children that had a delinquent referral, a status/unruly referral AND a neglect, dependent or abuse allegation.

With all 98 Tennessee Juvenile Courts participating, information regarding a total of 87,081 children and 132,451 cases were reported to TCJFCJ.

During 2006, the greatest percentage of all referrals were for alleged delinquent offenses. Status/Unruly offenses represented the next highest category of all referral reasons.

A status offense is an offense committed by a child that if committed by an adult, would not be considered an offense or unlawful act. An example of this is smoking when not legally an adult.



Truancy remained the most often reported referral reason within the Status/Unruly category of offenses for CY 2006 while Unruly Behavior remained the second most reported status offense.

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NEW ANNUAL REPORT FORMAT

The 2006 Annual Juvenile Statistical Report differs from those in years past not only in format but in expanded content. The annual report has been revised and is in two parts to make it easier to read and use. The general state-wide statistics, graphs and information are in the first portion of the report along with the summary information.

Detailed information such as tables, trend information, and charts broken down by specific courts, sex, race, and age, are in the second portion of the report. Readers will also find the information more comprehensive than in years past. The AOC is working toward providing as much detailed juvenile court information as possible and has expanded the annual report in response to requests for more data.

2006 DATA LIMITATIONS

The AOC was able to collect more complete juvenile court data in 2006 than they have in the past; however, please note that data from 2005 has not been included in the trend information charts. In 2005, one of the larger juvenile courts submitted their data in a summarized format which could not be included in the database. The lack of data from this court would have skewed the data giving a false representation of juvenile trend factors within the State. To overcome this challenge, the AOC chose the trend range of 1996 through 2004 and 2006, allowing for 10 years of accumulated facts that present the juvenile court data in the most meaningful way.

PART I

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THE TENNESSEE COUNCIL OF JUVENILE AND FAMILY COURT JUDGES

The Tennessee Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges (TCJFCJ), was created by the Tennessee General Assembly through legislation that was effective July 1, 1982. The TCJFCJ is the official organization of Tennessee judges having juvenile court jurisdiction.

Throughout its history the Council has represented juvenile court judges and court staff, providing an independent voice regarding issues affecting children, youth, families and communities. The Council meets semi-annually to consider matters concerning their members' official duties and obligations. The Council promotes best court practices and seeks a clearer understanding of what problems and specific challenges dependent, neglected, unruly, and delinquent children face when they come before the courts. The Council strives to increase the court's resources and legal options so they may better meet the needs of Tennessee's children and their families.

Among the staff serving the TCJFCJ are the AOC's general counsel, a juvenile court program specialist, and a juvenile data collection team. The AOC collects juvenile court statistical data and publishes quarterly and annual statistical reports on the activities of the state's juvenile courts as part of the services they provide to the TCJFCJ. The juvenile courts and the clerks of the courts provide juvenile court data as set out in the Tennessee Code Annotated § 37-1-506.

JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM IN TENNESSEE

JUVENILE COURT PHILOSOPHY

Tennessee's juvenile courts try to ensure that each child coming under their jurisdiction receives the best chance for suitable physical, mental, and moral development. The courts consider each child's case on its individual merits while adhering to three primary obligations: (1) protecting the community and society at large; (2) acting in the best interest and welfare of the child by means of protection, treatment, and rehabilitation and (3) upholding the dignity of the law. The courts continually seek out and implement changes in juvenile programs and operating methods that benefit their clients and attempt to break the cycle of juvenile delinquency and dysfunctional behavior.

Tennessee is home to 98 juvenile courts with 115 juvenile court judges. Of these 98 courts, 17 are designated "special act" juvenile courts while the remaining 81 are general sessions courts with juvenile jurisdiction. Each court, with the exception of Bristol and Johnson City, is county-based and administered with at least one juvenile court located in each of the state's 95 counties. While all of Tennessee's courts with juvenile jurisdiction do their best to follow the procedural guidelines established by the Tennessee Rules of Juvenile Procedure, there is little standardization in juvenile court size, case management procedures, and court administrative practices. This means that the systems and practices in Tennessee's juvenile courts vary widely and tend to reflect the needs and preferences of the people living in that particular community.

JUVENILE COURT JURISDICTION

A juvenile is defined as any individual who is under the chronological age of eighteen (18) years and who has not been previously transferred to adult court.

Juvenile courts deal not only with delinquency and status offenses, but also with issues concerning dependency and neglect, child abuse, child support, custody issues, establishing parentage, visitation, and the need for medical and/or mental health treatment for children. Tennessee's juvenile courts have jurisdiction within the following areas:

- Adjudication of children as dependent, neglected, abused, status/unruly, or delinquent
- Determination of custody
- Termination of parental rights
- Ordering of treatment, evaluation and/or commitment of mentally retarded and/or mentally ill children
- Commitment of children to the custody of the Department of Children Services
- Establishment of parentage
- Ordering and enforcement of child support for children of unwed parents

- Establishing visitation for non-custodial parents
- Enforcement of the compulsory school attendance laws
- Removal of the age restrictions on a minor's application for a marriage license
- Giving of judicial consent to a minor's employment or enlistment in the armed services if law requires such consent
- Giving of judicial consent to the medical treatment of a child when his/her parents or guardians are unable to do so
- Judicial authorization of an abortion without parental consent
- Adjudication of alleged traffic violations by persons under the age of eighteen
- Transfer of serious delinquency cases to criminal court for trial as adults

Pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated § 37-1-159, the juvenile court is a court of record. It may enforce its orders in any way in which a court of equity may enforce its orders and decrees, including by imprisonment and/or by fine for contempt.

JUVENILE COURT PROFESSIONAL STAFF

The dedication of the juvenile court staff is crucial to a smoothly functioning juvenile court. The typical juvenile court professional staff is comprised of the juvenile court judge; referees (who are present primarily in the larger courts); youth services officers and/or probation officers; and the juvenile court clerk.

JUVENILE COURT JUDGE

The juvenile court judge must be 30 years old, licensed to practice law (unless elected to the post prior to 1982 or if the county has no qualified attorney), a resident of his/her district for one year, and elected by the people. The judge is the chief administrator of the court in addition to his/her judicial duties and is seen as having the following characteristics:

- Is learned in the law
- Possesses administrative ability and experience
- Maintains a broad acquaintance with modern social problems affecting children and youth
- Has a realistic understanding of children and their behavior relative to their total life needs

JUVENILE COURT REFEREE

The referee is appointed by the judge and may be directed to hear any case or class of cases. He or she must be licensed to practice law and has the same authority and powers as the judge to issue process and to conduct proceedings. Referees are generally appointed when the court's juvenile justice population is greater than one judge can manage, or when a commitment is probable and the judge is not an attorney. Cases heard and adjudicated by a referee may be appealed to the judge.

YOUTH SERVICES OFFICER AND PROBATION OFFICER

The youth services officer (YSO) and probation officer (PO) are officials of the court and are as essential to judicial process functions as they are to children's welfare within the juvenile justice system. Their duties include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Juvenile Court Intake
- Pre-Hearing Investigations
- Referral
- Supervision of Youth
- Detention Screenings
- Counseling
- Record Keeping

JUVENILE COURT CLERK

The juvenile court clerk is the records keeping and management backbone of the juvenile court. The clerk maintains separate minutes, dockets, and legal records of all matters pertaining to juvenile court proceedings as required by law. Juvenile court clerks also collect all fees, fines and court costs assessed by the juvenile court.

JUVENILE COURT DATA COLLECTION PROCESS

DATA SUBMISSION AND REPORTS

All 98 Tennessee juvenile courts reported data to the TCJFCJ in 2006. Each court submitted its juvenile court data as required by Tennessee Code Annotated § 37-1-506. This data may be published and made available to properly concerned agencies and individuals or to any person upon request.

The courts used either JIF98, a data collection software program provided by the TCJFCJ, or other data collection software that they obtained for their court. Those courts using other data collection software are required to adhere to the data validation standards developed by AOC staff which help insure data accuracy. The courts submitted their data on computer readable media, or as electronic mail attachments. Tennessee juvenile courts have reported data to the TCJFCJ for the past 13 years, thereby distinguishing Tennessee as having one of the relatively few state-wide juvenile court databases in the country. All data is validated, any corrections are solicited from the courts, and the data is further analyzed and summarized to produce the following reports:

- Monthly Missing Data (if required)
- Monthly Data Validation
- Quarterly Summary
- Year-to-Date Summary
- Annual Summary
- Ad Hoc (by request)

DATA COLLECTED

The basic data collected in this process falls within the following categories:

- Referral and intake information
- Formal and informal court actions
- Dependency and neglect information
- Demographic information
- Detention information
- Disposition/Outcome information
- Internal periodic case reviews
- Formal judicial reviews

UNITS OF COUNT

The Council uses four (4) units of count.

- 1. Number of Children
- 2. Number of Cases
- 3. Number of Referrals
- 4. Number of Dispositions/Outcomes

Counting **children** is accomplished by using the unique identification number that the court assigns to each child. This identification method insures that each child will be counted only once for statistical purposes.

Each child may have one (1) or more cases. A **case** is defined as: "All referral reasons/charges reported to the court (via complaint, petition, motion, etc.) on a given day for a given child". This means that one case on an individual child may contain up to five **referral reasons**. The top five (5) referral reasons or charges on one referral date in each case are currently collected for statistical purposes. A **referral** is defined as a complaint, offense or reason that the juvenile court is involved with the child. Each case or referral has at least one (1) or more **dispositions** or **outcomes**, so the number of dispositions or outcomes may exceed the number of referrals.

The **disposition** or **outcome** is the definitive action taken or treatment plan decided regarding a particular case. The **disposition date**, which is the date that the case is disposed, is used to determine when the case will be counted and reported for statistical purposes. The Council determined that calendar year shall be used for the annual reporting period.

FUTURE JUVENILE COURT STATISTICAL DATA COLLECTION SYSTEM

Several initiatives are underway to improve juvenile court data collection and reporting methods. One of those initiatives is development of a new Juvenile Court Statistical Data Collection System which will replace the current JIF98 Data Collection System that has been in use for about 12 years. The future data collection system will be designed so that it is technologically up-to-date, flexible, and easy to modify to accommodate data collection needs as they arise.

There are several limitations to the current system. The JIF98 system does not allow courts to request case information once it is updated nor will it permit local data correction. The future system will allow the courts to update their own juvenile court case information, make corrections, and create statistical reports. This will eliminate the processing and transmission time the courts are now experiencing as they must request reports from the AOC. The courts may still request reports and the AOC will continue to provide the reporting services currently offered, but the courts will have more flexibility by being able to run their own reports. The replacement system will also be more efficient in utilizing data extracts from the courts that already have their own case management and data collection and reporting systems.

The current JIF98 data collection system has a limited amount of space for information. Many of the courts collect more extensive juvenile information than there are categories and iterations allowed in JIF98. The future data collection system will be aligned with the Tennessee Code Annotated which means that the Referral Reason categories will be expanded. The referral reasons that may be collected for each juvenile will no longer be limited to the top five (5) offenses. Every referral in each case can be counted. The Case Outcomes will no longer be limited to eight (8) total occurrences; All Case Outcomes will be counted. The future system will capture much more information and will be easy to modify to respond to changes in legislation that affect the juvenile court process. The eventual goal is to make it easier for the courts to collect and transmit accurate information as well as to streamline business procedures. These expanded capabilities will mean that the courts will be able to identify areas of concern earlier and with far more accuracy, allowing them to address issues they have identified and position their limited resources where they will be most effective.

The first and second phases of the Juvenile Court Statistical Data Collection Study were completed in late 2006. These were the first steps on the road to system development. The focus of the first phase of the project was to research and document business requirements and methods. The AOC sent a team to each of the Grand Divisions (East, Middle, and West Tennessee) to facilitate Joint Application Development (JAD) sessions. JAD sessions are the most efficient way to gather work flow information and to document business requirements. The teams met with subject matter experts (SMEs) who had volunteered to assist with the JAD sessions. Each group had representatives from small, medium, and large courts thus insuring that business processes were documented from as many points of view as possible. People on the job possess the most skills and are in the best position to make suggestions for improvements.

Another part of the study focused on juvenile court workflows and data collection method. The team created surveys and requested extensive information from every court with juvenile jurisdiction. They collected current information on each court's specific software systems and equipment. This gave the team a clearer understanding of what equipment would be necessary to support the new data collection system at the local level.

The second phase of this project was to determine the best planning and system development method with an eye toward system integrity, usability, and adaptability. The decision to develop the software in-house at the AOC was reached after extensive research into all of the available system development methods inside and outside the State environment. The same experienced resources will be used to develop the new system software that were used in the requirements gathering phases of the project.

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JUVENILE COURT REFERRAL PROCESS

The basic juvenile court process in Tennessee is comprised of three central phases:

- 1. Intake
- 2. Adjudication
- 3. Outcomes/Disposition

Juvenile court intake is a process by which the court reviews information in order to determine whether it has the authority to intervene in a child's life and in what manner it will administer its authority. The components of the intake process are referral to intake, detention screening, and assessment of how to handle the complaint.

Referral to intake begins with a complaint that has been filed. The complaints are filed by law enforcement, parents or other individuals or agencies requesting that the court exercise its authority. If the complainant requests that the juvenile be detained, the intake officer performs a detention screening to determine if there is probable cause (legal sufficiency) that the child committed the alleged offense and is subject to detention in accordance with the statute. The intake officer then determines if the complaint should be excluded, informally adjusted (a voluntary agreement between the intake officer, the child and the parents), or if a petition should be filed.

In most instances if a petition is filed the case goes into the adjudicatory phase. The juvenile court judge or referee hears the case in the adjudicatory phase to determine if the allegations in the petition are true. The court considers only formally admitted evidence in making its decision. When the allegations are substantiated, the judge will either proceed immediately or will set a later hearing date to determine the appropriate case outcome or disposition. If the allegations are not substantiated or cannot be proven, the petition will be dismissed.

The purpose of the dispositional phase is to determine an appropriate course of action for the child while taking into consideration his or her circumstances. The disposition occurs when the attempt to meet the child's social and rehabilitative needs through an appropriate course of treatment or action is made.

The Juvenile Court Referral Process Chart on the next page is a graphic depiction of the referral process and shows how many referrals were disposed state-wide in 2006.

Tennessee is divided into eight (8) major regions and four (4) metropolitan areas. These areas are shown on the previous page. The table and chart on the next page represent the number of juveniles referred to juvenile courts by region and metropolitan area. The East region referred the highest number of white males **6,422** and white females **4,451**. These numbers represent **54.1%** and **37.5%** of the East region's total juvenile court population **11,868** respectively. The Shelby County Metro area referred the highest number of African American males **6,936** and African American females **4,708**. These numbers represent **48.8%** and **33.1%** of Shelby County Metro area's total juvenile court population **14,205** respectively.

Children can have referrals in multiple categories. The drawing above shows that in the year 2006 there were 71,550 individual children referred to juvenile courts in Tennessee for delinquent referrals, 18,495 for status/unruly behavior, and 9,506 for neglect, dependent or abuse referrals. Of these children there were 6,491 that had a delinquent AND a status/unruly referral. There were 388 children that were referred for delinquent behavior AND a neglect, dependent or abuse allegation. There were 246 children referred that had both a status/unruly referral AND a neglect, dependent or abuse allegation. Also, there were 183 children that had a delinquent referral, a status/unruly referral AND a neglect, dependent or abuse allegation.

With all 98 Tennessee Juvenile Courts participating, information regarding a total of 87,081 children and 132,451 cases were reported to TCJFCJ.

During 2006, the greatest percentage of all referrals were for alleged delinquent offenses. Status/Unruly offenses represented the next highest category of all referral reasons.

A status offense is an offense committed by a child that if committed by an adult, would not be considered an offense or unlawful act. An example of this is smoking when not legally an adult.



Truancy remained the most often reported referral reason within the Status/Unruly category of offenses for CY 2006 while Unruly Behavior remained the second most reported status offense.

White males in the delinquent category total **33,762** and represent **42.9%** of the juvenile court population with delinquent referrals **78,612** outnumbering their female counterparts who total **13,856** and are **17.6%** of the juvenile population with delinquent referrals. African American males in the delinquent category total **20,539** and represent **26.1%** of the juvenile population with delinquent referrals outnumbering their female counterparts who total **7,405** and represent **9.4%** of the juvenile population with delinquent referrals.

White males in the status/unruly category total **10,472** and represent **41.2%** of the total juvenile court population **25,415** with status/unruly referrals outnumbering their female counterparts who total **7,620** and represent **30.0%** of the total juvenile population with status/unruly referrals. African American males in the status/unruly category total **3,865** and represent **15.2%** of the total juvenile population with status/unruly referrals and outnumber their female counterparts who total **2,274** and represent **8.9%** of the total juvenile population with status/unruly referrals.

White males in the neglected/dependent category total 2,879 and represent 27.9% of the total juvenile court population 10,323 with neglected/dependent referrals and were outnumbered by their female counterparts who total 3,112 and represent **30.1%** of the total juvenile population with neglected/dependent African American males in the neglected/dependent category total referrals. 16.0% of the total juvenile 1.647 and represent population with neglected/dependent referrals. Their numbers are similar to their female counterparts who total **1,675** and represent slightly higher percentage of the total juvenile population with neglected/dependent referrals at **16.2%**.

Please note the tables on the next page graphically depict what was discussed above and be advised that neglected/dependent data is underreported to the Council because of the varying methods different juvenile courts use to file petitions.

REFERRALS BY AGE GROUP, RACE, AND SEX FOR CY 2006

The chart on the next page depicts the number of referrals to juvenile courts by age, race and sex. When looking at age, the 2006 data indicated that the largest number of referrals totaling **53,763** and representing **33.3%** of the total number of referrals **161,631** fall within the 15 through 16 years of age category. White males represented the greatest number of those referrals in this age category totaling **21,828**, or **40.6%** of the juvenile court population in the 15 through 16 years of age category and outnumbering their female counterparts who totaled **11,830** represented the second largest number of referrals in the 15 through 16 years of age category totaling **22.0%** of juveniles in this age category. African American males represented the second largest number of referrals in the 15 through 16 years of age category totaling **12,390** or **23.0%** and outnumbering their female counterparts who totaled **5,527** or **10.3%** of the juveniles in this age category.

The chart depicts these numbers graphically and shows that they decrease as juveniles age as shown in the 19 and over years of age category which had the fewest referrals **2,463**, or **1.52%** reported for juveniles whose ages were known at the time of referral.

The largest number of children referred totaling **26,501**, representing **30.4%**, fall within the 15 through 16 years of age category. White males represented the greatest number of those children in this age category totaling **10,858**, or **41.0%** and outnumbering their female counterparts who totaled **6,601** representing **24.9%** of the juvenile court population in the 15 through 16 years of age category. African American males represented the third largest number of children referred in the 15 through 16 years of age category totaling **4,983** or **18.8%** outnumbering their female counterparts who totaled **2,988** or **11.3%** of juveniles referred in this age category.

Juveniles in the ages 19 and over category had the lowest number of children referred **1,872** or **2.1%** of those whose ages were known at the time of referral.

White males (32,391) outnumbered their female (21,391) counterparts and represented 37.2% as opposed to 24.6% of the juvenile court population (87,081) as a whole. African American males (16,220) represented 18.6% of the juvenile court population and outnumbered their female (10,868) counterparts and represented 12.5% of the juvenile court population. These percentages are consistent with years 1995 through 2005.

Children of Hispanic Origin by Race and Sex for CY 2006

The Children of Hispanic Origin by Race and Sex for CY 2006 table shows the number of children that were referred to juvenile court in 2006. All racial categories may contain juveniles who were considered to be of Hispanic origin or ethnicity. Please note that some courts classify Hispanic origin as a race and others treat Hispanic origin as an ethnicity and categorize these juveniles as white. Some courts do not report this data at all which means that data on Hispanic ethnicity or origin is underreported in Tennessee.

The AOC has asked the National Center for Juvenile Justice (NCJJ) for clarification and guidance on the definition of Hispanic origin and how it should be reported. Until the NCJJ issues a definitive answer the AOC sought clarification elsewhere. "*The Standards for Maintaining, Collecting, and Presenting Federal Data on Race and Ethnicity (Excerpt from Federal Register, October 30, 1997)*" defines Hispanic or Latino as follows: A person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race. The term, "Spanish origin," can be used in addition to "Hispanic or Latino."

COURTS REPORTING THE HIGHEST PERCENTAGE OF MINORITY RACES AND SEX

Races are currently defined as follows: White, African American, Native American, Asian, and Mixed Race. The AOC has asked the National Center for Juvenile Justice (NCJJ) for clarification and expansion of these categories based on requests from different juvenile courts. The courts do not feel that their juvenile population is accurately represented when their racial categories are limited to those indicated above.

The information below is quoted directly from the publication, "<u>Standards for</u> <u>Maintaining, Collecting, and Presenting Federal Data on Race and Ethnicity</u> (<u>Excerpt from Federal Register, October 30, 1997</u>)</u>", which "provides a minimum standard for maintaining, collecting, and presenting data on race and ethnicity for all Federal reporting purposes. The categories in this classification are socialpolitical constructs and should not be interpreted as being scientific or anthropological in nature. They are not to be used as determinants of eligibility for participation in any Federal program. The standards have been developed to provide a common language for uniformity and comparability in the collection and use of data on race and ethnicity by Federal agencies. The standards have five categories for data on race: **American Indian** or **Alaska Native**, **Asian**, **Black** or **African American**, **Native Hawaiian** or **Other Pacific Islander**, and **White**. There are two categories for data on ethnicity: '**Hispanic or Latino**,' and '**Not Hispanic or Latino**.' "

"1. Categories and Definitions The minimum categories for data on race and ethnicity for Federal statistics, program administrative reporting, and civil rights compliance reporting are defined as follows:

--American Indian or Alaska Native. A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America), and who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment.

--Asian. A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent including, for example, Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam

--Black or African American. A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa. Terms such as "Haitian" or "Negro" can be used in addition to "Black or African American."

--Hispanic or Latino. A person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race. The term, "Spanish origin," can be used in addition to "Hispanic or Latino."

--Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander. A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.

-- White. A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa."

The immigrant population in Tennessee has increased so much that the juvenile courts have found that there has been a corresponding increase in the number of juveniles of different nationalities and races coming before them. The courts have asked that the racial categories be expanded to reflect individuals of Middle Eastern descent, for example, who are now being classified as White, African American, or Asian as there is no accurate category in which to report these statistics except as noted. The federal standard states that these juveniles would be included in the White category, but the courts would like the statistics to reflect the juvenile population in their jurisdiction more definitively so they can identify areas of need for resource allocation and intervention practices.

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NUMBER OF INDIVIDUAL CHILDREN, CASES, AND REFERRAL COUNTS BY COURT CY 2006

The juvenile courts reporting the largest number of children referred whose cases were disposed in CY 2006 were Shelby County/Memphis (14,205) who reported the highest number, Davidson County/Nashville (8,528), Knox County/Knoxville (6,027), Hamilton County/Chattanooga (4,003) and Blount County (2,199). Hancock County had the lowest number of children referred (42) whose cases were disposed in 2006. These statistics and those for each court are reported in this portion of the report.

The reader should note that the definition of case is as follows: "All referral reasons/charges reported to the court (via complaint, petition, motion, etc.) on a given day for a given child." It is also important to be aware that the juvenile data is counted based on the date of disposition. This is the date that the case is disposed or adjudicated by the juvenile court and then reported to the TCJFCJ during calendar year 2006.

REFERRALS BY TYPE OF OFFENSE, AGE GROUP, RACE, AND SEX IN CY 2006

The Referrals by Type of Offense, Age Group, Race, and Sex tables in CY 2006 show children who have been referred to juvenile courts by type of offense, age group, race, and sex within the following categories: Delinquent, Status/Unruly, Dependency and Neglect, Other Violations ("Violation of Pretrial Diversion" and "Violation of Informal Adjustment"), Special Proceedings and Other (includes any referrals that do not fall within the categories listed above).

White males have the highest number **(13,919)** in the Delinquent category, ages 15 through 16 years followed by African American Males **(8,794)**. White Females **(5,846)** are most often found in the age group of 15 through 16 years with 17 through 18 years containing the next highest number of **(5,389)** referrals. African American Females **(3,211)** are most often found in the age group 15 through 16 years followed by the age group 13 through 14 years containing the next highest number **(1,827)** of referrals.

In the Status/Unruly category, white males **(4,671)**, white females **(3,481)**, African American males **(1,815)** and African American females **(1,141)** are found most often in the age group 15 through 16 years.

In the Dependency and Neglect category, **68.7%** of the total referrals **(10,323)** are most often found in the Birth through 10 years group. Referrals for White Males **(2,046)** and White Females **(2,038)** are followed by referrals for African American Males **(1,083)** and African American Females **(1,103)**.

In the referrals for Other Violations category, of which there were **237** total, the highest numbers for all youth **(117)** appear in the 15 through 16 years age group. Other Violations include both: Violation of Pretrial Diversion and Violation of Informal Adjustment.

In the Special Proceedings category the highest numbers for all youth and the highest number in all categories **(19,698)** appears in the Birth through 10 years age group. Special Proceedings include the following: Judicial Review, Administrative Review, Foster Care Review, Custody, Visitation, Paternity/Legitimation, Child Support, Requests for Medical Treatment, and Consent to Marry.

Other, which is the final category, is one that the Council looks forward to minimizing when the future data collection system is in use. This category is used to identify referrals that do not fit under other classifications and the numbers show that a total of **10,592** referrals were placed in this group.

LIVING ARRANGEMENT OF THE CHILD AT THE TIME OF REFERRAL TO JUVENILE COURT

CY 2006

Consistent with the data gathered in previous years, the Living Arrangement of Juveniles by Race and Sex for CY 2006 chart shows that within the general juvenile court population (87,081), the highest number of children, (33,283) were reported to be living "With Mother" at the time of referral to juvenile court. This is **38.2%** of the total of all children referred. The second and third most reported living arrangements for the general juvenile court population were "Unknown" **13,595** or **15.6%** and "With both Biological Parents" **13,375** or **15.4%**.

When examining the 2006 juvenile court population by race and gender categories, different living arrangement patterns can be seen. White female data revealed that of **21,391** children, the highest percentage **(34.8%)** were living "With Mother", **18.0%** were living "With Both Biological Parents", and **14.5%** fell into the "Unknown" category.

Data regarding African American females reflected a different living arrangement pattern. Slightly more than half of African American females **(50.8%)**, of a total of **10,868**, were reported to be living "With Mother", followed by **15.7%** living "With Relatives", and **12.5%** "Unknown".

Data regarding white males revealed that of **32,391**, the highest percentage **(31.6%)** of children were living "With Mother", over the second most reported living arrangement, living "With Both Biological Parents" **22.7%**, and was followed by the "Unknown" category **14.1%**.

Data associated with **16,220** African American males revealed that just over half **(51.8%)** of African American males were reported as living "With Mother" at the time of referral, **13.3%** were reported as living "With Relatives", and **11.5%** were reported as "Unknown".

SCHOOL STATUS OF INDIVIDUAL CHILDREN AT THE TIME OF REFERRAL TO JUVENILE COURT CY 2006

In 2006, a majority **(64.5%)** of the juvenile court population **(87,081)** were reported as being "Enrolled" in school either full or part-time at the time of referral to juvenile court. **12.8%** were reported as "Not Enrolled" in school. The "Not Enrolled" in school category also included those children who had been expelled. It should be noted that school enrollment for **19,803** or **22.7%** of the juvenile court population was reported as "Unknown".

3,052 or **3.5%** of the general juvenile court population was reported as being enrolled in a special education curriculum at the time of referral. **53,447** or **61.4%** of the juvenile court population were reported as "Not Enrolled" in a special education curriculum and the special education status of **30,582** children, or **35.1%** of this same population was reported as "Unknown".

REFERRAL INFORMATION BY RACE, SEX, AND CLASS OF REFERRAL/OFFENSE 2006

Information regarding **161,631** referrals disposed of by Tennessee juvenile courts was reported in 2006. Nearly half **(48.6%)** of the 2006 referral reasons disposed of by juvenile courts fell into the category of alleged Delinquent offenses. Status offenses represented **15.7%** of the total referral reasons reported to the juvenile court, while Non-offense referral reasons comprised an additional **35.6%** of the total.

For reporting, the broad categories of referrals/offenses: Delinquent, Status, and Non-offense, were broken into the following classes of referrals/offenses:

Offenses Against Persons – Delinquent offenses such as criminal homicide, assault, rape, etc., that were committed against persons.

Offenses Against Property – Delinquent offenses such as burglary, arson, vandalism, etc., that were committed against property.

Illegal Conduct – Delinquent offenses such as possession or sale of controlled substances, disorderly conduct, criminal trespass, etc.

Status Offenses – Offenses committed by a child that, if committed by an adult, would not be considered an offense or unlawful act. These can include such actions as runaway, truancy, unruly behavior, etc.

Dependency/Neglect Issues – Issues that affect the safety and well being of the referred child, such as abuse, dependency, neglect, termination of parental rights, etc. This is a non-offense category as the referred child is the victim and is not the offender.

Parentage Issues – Issues that affect custody of the child, visitation, determining parentage and child support.

Other Violation Proceedings – Violation of pretrial diversion and violation of informal adjustment.

Special Proceedings – Judicial reviews, administrative reviews, and foster care reviews that are conducted by the court. This is also a Non-offense category.

The Class of Referrals by Race and Sex for CY 2006 chart indicates the reported classes of referral reasons for each race and sex in descending order of occurrence. The summary of the three most often reported classes of referral/offense by race and sex are detailed below.

Among White Males, the two most commonly reported classes of referral/offense were "Illegal Conduct" and "Status Offenses". **38.3%** or **24,101** of white male referral reasons **62,889** fell under "Illegal Conduct" and **16.7%** or **10,472** fell under "Status Offenses". "Parentage" at **10.0%** or **6,297** represented the third most reported class of referral/offense for white male referrals followed by "Offenses Against Property" at **9.8%** or **6,160**.

Among African American Males, the most commonly reported class of referral/offense was "Illegal Conduct". **36.2%** or **12,225** of African American male referral reasons fell under "Illegal Conduct". The second and third most reported classes of referral/offense for African American males were "Offenses Against Persons" at **12.6%** or **4,254** and "Offenses Against Property" at **12.0%** or **4,060**.

Among White Females, the first and second most reported classes of referral/offense were "Illegal Conduct" and "Status Offenses". **28.4%** or **10,560** of white female referral reasons fell under "Illegal Conduct" and **20.5%** or **7,620** fell under "Status Offenses". The third most reported class of referral/offense for white females was "Parentage" at **15.6%** or **5,816**.

Among African American Females, the first and second most often reported classes were "Illegal Conduct" and "Parentage". **24.3%** or **4,215** of African American Female referral reasons fell under "Illegal Conduct" and **20.2%** or **3,511** fell under "Parentage". The third most reported class of referral/offense for African American females was "Status Offenses" at **13.1%** or **2,274**.

REFERRAL REASONS BY TYPE, of Offense, RACE, AND SEX IN 2006

The tables on the following pages depict referral reasons by type of offense, race and sex. Since this data is spread between 83 potential referral reasons, many of the percentages presented are small. It is important to note that many juvenile courts do not hear traffic cases. In these jurisdictions, traffic cases go to the court with jurisdiction over adult traffic violations. It is also important to note that any categories left blank or not reported in the Demographic Information area which concerns sex, race, Hispanic origin, living arrangement, and education information, are calculated as "Unknown".

The 2006 data showed the most commonly reported delinquent referral reasons to be "Traffic", **(18,941)** "Assault" **(7,777)**, "Theft of Property" **(6,798)**, "Violation of Probation" **(6,274)**, "Disorderly Conduct" **(6,217)**, and "Possession of Controlled Substances" **(4,384)**. The most often reported status offense referral reasons were "Truancy" **(7,312)**, "Unruly Behavior" **(5,985)**, "Possession of Tobacco Products" **(4,250)**, "In-state Runaway" **(3,485)**, "Violation of Curfew" **(2,759)**, and "Violation of a Valid Court Order" **(1,524)**.

"Child Support" **(10,261)**, "Dependency and Neglect" **(9,315)**, "Custody" **(8,566)**, "Judicial Review" **(7,909)** and "Foster Care Review" **(3,579)** are the most prevalent within the non-offense category.

The top four referral reasons reported for White Males in 2006 were "Traffic", "Judicial Review", "Other", and "Violation of Probation". The total referrals were **62,889** and the top four referral percentages for White Males follow: "Traffic" at **10,241** referrals was **16.3%**, "Judicial Review" at **3,850** was **6.1%**, "Other" at **3,657** was **5.8%**, and "Violation of Probation" at **3,131** was **5.0%**.

The top four referral reasons reported for African American Males in 2006 were "Assault" "Disorderly Conduct", "Theft of Property", and "Child Support". The total referrals were **33,753** and the top four referral percentages for African American Males follow: "Assault" at **2,510** was **7.4%**, "Disorderly Conduct" at **2,426** was **7.2%**, "Other" at **2,347** was **7.0%**, and "Theft of Property at **1,954** was **5.8%**.

The top four referral reasons reported for white females in 2006 were "Traffic", "Dependency/Neglect", "Truancy", and "Judicial Review". The total referrals were **37,188** and the top four referral percentages for White Females follow: "Traffic" at **5,299** referrals was **14.2%**, "Dependency/Neglect" at **2,807** was **7.5%**, "Truancy" at **2,789** was **7.5%**, and "Judicial Review" at **2,722** was **7.3%**.

The top four referral reasons reported for African American females in 2006 were "Disorderly Conduct", "Child Support", "Assault", and "Dependency/Neglect". The total referrals were **17,341** and the top four referral percentages for African American Females follow: "Disorderly Conduct" at **1,907** was **11.0%**, "Child Support" at **1,774** was **10.2%**, "Assault" at **1,723** was **9.9%**, and "Dependency/Neglect" at **1,566** was **9.0%**.

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THE SOURCE OF REFERRALS TO THE JUVENILE COURT IN 2006

Anyone who perceives a need for the juvenile court to intervene in a child's affairs can refer that child to the juvenile court. Frequently, the referral source is closely related to the reason for referral. For example, schools refer truants and law enforcement officers refer children who have committed illegal acts.

As the Source of Referrals by Race and Sex for CY 2006 table and chart show, "Law Enforcement" was the referral source most often cited at **46.8%**, "Parents" were the second at **10.5%**, and the "Department of Children's Services"(DCS) was the third at **10.1%**. "Court Staff" at **8.5%**, was the fourth most often cited referral source and "School" at **6.6%**, was the fifth.

Six Most Frequent Referral Reasons by Source in 2006

When looking at the six (6) most frequently reported referral reasons associated with each referral source, the tables on the following pages reveal that in 2006, law enforcement personnel most often referred juveniles for traffic complaints, while custody was the reason most often cited for referral by parents and relatives. Self referrals, referrals by community service agencies, other state departments, child and parent, and the District Attorney all had child support issues at the top. With regard to schools, truancy remained the most cited referral reason and possession of tobacco products was the second. Most DCS and social agency referrals were for dependency and neglect issues. Victims continued to refer most often for assault and hospitals referred most often for paternity and legitimation.

SOURCE OF REFERRALS BY TYPE OF OFFENSE, RACE, AND SEX FOR CY 2006

Tables on the following pages show the source of referrals by type of offense, race, and sex of juveniles. The types of offenses are; Delinquent, Status/Unruly, Dependency and Neglect, Other Violation, Special Proceedings, and Other.

Law enforcement personnel are most likely to refer juveniles in the delinquent category and did so **79.8%** of the time. The largest percentages of all Delinquent referrals **(78,612)** by race and gender were as follows: **42.9%** white males, **26.1%** African American males, **17.6%** white females, and **9.4%** African American females.

Law enforcement personnel were first with **37.7%** of referrals in the Status/Unruly category **(25,415)**. The largest percentages of Status/Unruly referrals by race and gender were as follows: **41.2%** white males, **30.0%** white females, **15.2%** African American males and **8.9%** African American females.

The Department of Children's Services (DCS) referred **52.3%** in the Dependency and Neglect category **(5,398)**. The largest percentages of Status/Unruly referrals by race and gender were as follows: **30.1%** white females, **27.9%** white males, **16.2%** African American females, and **16.0%** African American males.

Please note that each juvenile court used their own methods for filing Dependency and Neglect petitions and the court personnel responsible for these actions may not be the same level or type in every court. This means that the juvenile data collector may not have seen the case or may not have received the data that results from the petition filed on the particular case. It is because of these reasons that the dependency and neglect data most certainly is underreported to the Council.

MANNER OF HANDLING THE REFERRAL IN CY 2006

After determining that a referral warrants action, the court must decide whether to process the referral formally or informally. This decision affects the manner in which the court staff handles the referral. If the referral is to be disposed by a judge or referee through formal adjudicatory and dispositional proceedings, then a petition outlining the charges must be filed as part of the intake process. The filing of a petition, however, does not necessarily result in a formal hearing.

The Intake Actions at Referral by Race and Sex for CY 2006 table and chart show that petitions were filed in **65.8%** of the 2006 referrals and motions were filed in **4.4%**. These figures reflect the number of petitions or motions that resulted in judicial action of some kind. Petitions that were filed but ended in an informal adjustment are explained later in this report.

Citations, which law enforcement may use in lieu of a petition, were issued in **12.8%** of the referrals, paternity actions accounted for **.05%**, and judicial, administrative and foster care reviews accounted for **5.5%**.

DETENTION STATISTICS AT REFERRAL BY INDIVIDUAL CHILD BY RACE AND SEX FOR CY 2006

One of the immediate decisions the court must make after receiving an offenserelated referral is whether or not to detain the child. When the court believes that a child referred for offense-related reasons is in need of protection or may be a threat to the community, the court may elect to detain the child.

Detention Statistics of Children Referred by Race and Sex for CY 2006 revealed that of the children referred **(87,081)** percentages fell into the following categories: **9.2%** in the "Juvenile Detention Facility", **1.7%** in "Other", and **.9%** in "Non-secure Placement". The table also shows that **66.8%** of the children referred were in the "Does Not Apply" category because they were not considered for detention.

Of those children placed in a juvenile detention facility, **2,500** were white males, **2,755** were African American males, **1,289** were white females, and **1,221** were African American females. These numbers are notable because the total white males **(32,391)** referred were nearly twice the total African American males **(16,220)** and the total white females referred **(21,391)** were nearly twice the total African American females **(10,868)**.

The data also revealed that **23** children or **.03%**, were placed in adult jails completely separated by sight and sound from all adult prisoners, and **29** children or **.033%**, were placed in adult jails with partial or no separation.

Detention Statistics at Referral by Individual Cases for CY 2006 show a slightly different percentage (11.1%) in the "Juvenile Detention Facility" category, because the numbers are based on total cases (132,451) and not total children (87,081). One child may have been referred multiple times which increased the percentage shown. Remember that the definition of case is "All referral reasons/charges reported to the court (via complaint, petition, motion, etc.) on a given day for a given child". This table shows that 67.4% of the cases referred were in the "Does Not Apply" category because they were not considered for detention. Children who are not considered for detention had referrals that did not make them eligible for in detention in a facility or the decision was made not to detain them.

There are several alternatives to detention, such as non-secure placements, which provide children with shelter and supervision in a setting that enables them to continue as many normal activities as possible. Temporary Holding Resources (THR), emergency foster homes, and shelters constitute most of the non-secure placements used by juvenile courts. The 2006 data show **1,176** or **.9%** of the juvenile court cases resulted in **767** children being placed in one of these non-secure settings.

PLACEMENT AFTER SECURE DETENTION HEARING BY INDIVIDUAL CHILD BY RACE AND SEX FOR CY 2006

Placement after Secure Detention Hearing by Individual Child, Race, and Sex for CY 2006 shows placement determinations for all of the children that were referred to the juvenile court. The TCA Rules of Juvenile Procedure, Rule 6, Time Limits for Detention and Temporary Custody Preliminary Hearings, specifically states the following: "In the case of a child alleged to be delinquent, a detention hearing shall be held no later than seventy two (72) hours after the child is placed in detention to determine whether his or her detention is required."

Please note that secure detention hearings for detention determination must be held repeatedly until the child has been brought before the juvenile court for formal adjudication. If the child has not been brought before the juvenile court at the end of the seventy two (72) hour period, another secure detention hearing must be held in order to detain the child for a further seventy two (72) hour period.

Placement of children after secure detention hearing statistics show that the percentages fell into the following categories: **70.7%** in "Does not Apply", **20.4%** in "Unknown/Not Reported", **6.3%** in "Returned to Prior Living Arrangement", and **1.4%** in "Juvenile Detention Facility".

Of those children placed in a juvenile detention facility, **576** were African American males, **332** were white males, **145** were African American females, and **90** were white females. These numbers are notable because the total white males **(32,391)** referred were nearly twice the total African American males **(16,220)** and the total white females referred **(21,391)** were nearly twice the total African American females **(10,868)**.

The data also revealed that **31** cases resulted in **17** children, or **.02%**, being placed in adult jails.

Placement after Secure Detention Hearing by Individual Case for CY 2006 shows placement determinations for all of the cases that were referred to the juvenile court. As there may be more than one referral for a given child, the statistics are higher when considering cases.

Placement after secure detention hearing statistics by individual cases showed a slightly different percentage (2.0%) in the "Juvenile Detention Facility" category, because the numbers are based on total cases (132,451) and not total children (87,081). One child may have been referred multiple times which increased the percentage shown. Remember that the definition of case is "All referral reasons/charges reported to the court (via complaint, petition, motion, etc.) on a given day for a given child". This table shows that 71.4% of the cases placed were in the "Does Not Apply" category because they were not considered for detention. Children who are not considered for detention had referrals that did not make them eligible for in detention in a facility or the decision made was not to detain them. The statistics showed that 17.9% were in the "Unknown/Not Reported" category, 7.1% were in the "Returned to Prior Living Arrangement" category, and 2.0% were in the "Juvenile Detention Facility" category.

DISPOSITIONAL PROCEDURES FOR CY 2006

As mentioned before, after a referral is made to the juvenile court, decisions are made regarding how the court will proceed. If the decision is made to handle the referral informally, two options are open to the court: pretrial diversion and informal adjustment. These two procedures are quite similar in that they are both a voluntary agreement between the court officer, the child, and the parents that address the problem but avoid a formal court hearing and an official finding of guilt. The difference between pretrial diversion and informal adjustment is in the extent to which the judge or referee is involved. Pretrial diversion requires judicial approval of the voluntary agreement. Informal adjustment is subject to judicial approval, but does not require it prior to initiation. Dispositional Procedures for CY 2006 reveals that **16.2%** of all the referrals to juvenile court were handled by informal adjustment. **5.8%** of all referrals disposed by other actions were handled by pretrial diversions.

When the court believes that it is in the best interest of the child and/or the community, a formal adjudicatory proceeding or hearing is held regarding the child's referral to juvenile court. These statistics are shown in Referrals Disposed by Formal Adjudicatory Proceedings. The adjudicatory hearing is a formal proceeding in which the judge or referee determines whether the motion made on behalf of the child (or the complaint made against the child) is substantiated. If substantiation of the motion/complaint occurs, a dispositional hearing must be held; this can happen either immediately or at a later date. The statistics indicate that **44.5%** of the referrals to juvenile court resulted in a formal adjudicatory proceeding. Of the formally adjudicated proceedings, **64.8%** were substantiated, **25.8%** formally dismissed and **9.4%** were retired.

FORMAL AND INFORMAL ACTIONS BY RACE AND SEX FOR CY 2006

Formal and informal actions statistics by race and sex show referrals were handled in the follow manner: **18.3%** of the total number of referrals Substantiated Delinquent, **17.1%** Special Proceeding, **16.2%** Informal Adjustment, **11.5%** Dismissed, **8.5%** Other, and **4.1%** Case Held Open.

Of the formal and informal actions in the Substantiated Delinquent category **(29,526)** the following percentages by race were shown: **44.4%** White Males, **29.4%** African American Males, **14.4%** White Females, and **7.6%** African American Females.

In the Special Proceedings category **(27,644)** the following percentages by race were shown: **38.0%** White Males, **30.4%** White Females, **11.7%** African American Males, and **9.9%**, African American Females.

Of the Informal Adjustment Category **(26,128)** the following percentages by race were shown: **33.5%** African American Males, **28.0%** White Males, **18.3%** African American Females, and **16.9%** White Females.

FORMAL AND INFORMAL ACTIONS BY TYPE OF OFFENSE, RACE, AND SEX FOR CY 2006

The types of offense are: Delinquent, Status, Dependency and Neglect, Other Violations, Special Proceedings, and Other. The tables on the following pages show how the different types of referrals were handled.

The following statistics show the larger percentages found in the most prevalent categories. **30.9%** of the delinquent referrals **(78,612)** were Substantiated Delinquent, **23.8%** were Informally Adjusted, **11.9%** were Dismissed, **8.8%** were Diverted Pretrial, and **6.8%** were Retired.

27.9% Status/Unruly referrals **(25,415)** were Complaint Substantiated Status Offender, **19.9%** were Informally Adjusted, **14.6%** were Dismissed, **13.1%** were Substantiated Delinquent, **5.7%** were Special Proceeding, and **5.4%** were Other.

39.5% Dependent and Neglected referrals **(10,323)** were Substantiated Dependent and Neglect, **24.6%** were Special Proceeding, and **11.5%** were Dismissed.

41.3% Special Proceedings referrals **(36,452)** were handled with Special Proceeding, **17.1%** were Other, **12.9%** were Review Concluded, **9.5%** were Dismissed, **7.1%** were Complaint Substantiated Dependent and Neglected, and **6.0%** were Case Held Open.

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NUMBER OF INDIVIDUAL CHILDREN TRANSFERRED TO ADULT COURT BY COURT, RACE, AND SEX CY 2006

The 2006 data was analyzed to determine the number of children transferred to adult court for alleged delinquent offenses. The data shows that **289** children were transferred to adult court in 2006. Males were the overwhelming majority of transferred children (**268**) at **92.7%**. **70.2%** of the children transferred were African American males, while their white male counterparts represented **21.5%** of the overall transfers. African American females represented **3.5%**. White females represented **2.4%** of all transfers.

This represents over three times as many delinquent African American males transferred to adult courts (203) than white males (62), despite the fact that there are nearly twice as many delinquent white males (32,391)* as there are African American males (16,220) in the general juvenile population. Delinquent African American males commit offenses listed under TCA §37-1-134 (1) at a higher rate in both frequency and percentage than delinquent white males.

The majority of these children were sixteen (16) years of age or more at the time of the alleged conduct, or the child was less than sixteen (16) years of age if such child was charged with the offense of first degree murder, second degree murder, rape, aggravated rape, rape of a child, aggravated robbery, especially aggravated robbery, kidnapping, aggravated kidnapping or especially aggravated kidnapping, or an attempt to commit any such offenses.

The court reporting the largest number of children transferred to adult court was Shelby County Juvenile Court with **155**. This court accounted for **53.6%** of the statewide transfers. The court with the next highest number of transfers to adult court was Davidson County Juvenile Court with **30** children transferred which accounted for **10.4%** of the statewide population. Thirty eight (38) courts reported at least one transfer.

Individual Outcome/Dispositional Actions by Race and Sex for 2006

This portion of the annual report concerns individual dispositional actions that the juvenile courts took in 2006. Most of the percentages presented will be small because the data is spread over 64 categories.

Since 2001, children are counted only once per disposition date. The numbers are more accurate when the data is counted this way but it has resulted in lower Outcome Referral totals than in past years. The lower totals are most noticeable when comparing current data to annual report data published before 2001.

The tables on the following pages reveal that the most often reported specific dispositional choice was "Other". "Other" is not presented as the most often cited disposition in the paragraphs below because it is difficult to interpret the precise meaning of this choice. All of the calculations were based on **242,216** total dispositional actions.

The top three dispositional actions reported were "Court Costs" (25,758) with 10.6% of the total dispositional actions, "Case Dismissed" (17,549) with 7.2%, and "Warned/Counseled" (15,125) with 6.2%. Percentages by sex and race within the top three dispositional actions reported were: 53.4% white males, 27.8% white females, 10.1% African American males, and 5.1% African American females within "Court Costs", 39.1% white males, 24.8% white females, 18.5% African American males, and 30.3% African American males, 28.4% white males, 19.8% African American females, and 18.4% white females within "Warned/Counseled".

The most often reported dispositional actions associated with white males were: **13.3%** Court Costs, **6.7%** Public Service, **6.6%** Case Dismissed, and **5.4%** Held Open for Review.

The most often reported dispositional actions associated with white females were: **12.0%** Court Costs, **7.3%** Case Dismissed, **6.1%** Held Open for Review, and **4.7%** Warned/Counseled.

The most often reported dispositional actions associated with African American males were: **10.7%** Warned/Counseled, **7.6%** Case Dismissed, **6.1%** Court Costs, and **5.6%** Held Open for Review.

The most often reported dispositional actions associated with African American females were: **13.5%** Warned/Counseled, **9.3%** Case Dismissed, **7.1%** Held Open for Review, and **6.6%** Placement with Relative/Other Individual.

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JUVENILE COURT REFERRALS DISPOSED STATE-WIDE BASED ON NUMBER OF REFERRALS

As mentioned earlier in this report, juvenile court cases and referrals can be disposed by judges, referees, youth services officers, or probation officers. All cases resulting in a formal hearing and adjudication must be disposed by judicial staff, which includes judges, referees or special judges. Cases that are handled informally through informal adjustment or other informal, non-judicial actions can be disposed by the court officers.

The data as reflected in Breakdown of Referrals by Court Personnel Executing the Action in CY 2006 shows that **52.2%** of all referral reasons **(161,631)** were disposed by judicial staff: **52.2%** by Judges, **32.6%** by Referees. Another **12.2%** were disposed by Youth Services/Probation Officers, and **3.0%** by Other/Not Reported.

<u>Glossary</u>

Abuse	When a child is suffering from, has sustained, or may be in immediate danger of suffering from or sustaining a wound; injury; disability; or physical or mental condition caused by brutality, neglect, or other actions or inaction of a parent, relative, guardian, or caretaker.
Adjudication	Judicial fact finding determination (judgment) of a case (e.g.,. guilty or not guilty).
Aftercare	The supervision given to a child for a limited period of time after they are released from commitment to a state agency.
Burglary	The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.
CASA	Court Appointed Special Advocate (usually volunteers) who serve to ensure that the needs and interests of a child in child protection judicial proceedings are fully protected.
Commitment	A decision by the judge that a child should be sent to a state agency for monitoring or care of the child.
Contempt of Court	A willful disobedience of a court order or willful interference with the administration of justice.
Crime Index	Includes homicide, robbery, aggravated assault, rape, larceny and burglary.
DCS	The Tennessee Department of Children's Services.
Delinquency	Acts or conduct in violation of criminal law.
Delinquent Act	An act committed by a juvenile that, if committed by an adult, would require prosecution in a criminal court. Because the act is committed by a juvenile it falls within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.
Dependency Case	Those cases covering neglect or inadequate care on the part of parents or guardians, such as abandonment or desertion; abuse or cruel treatment; improper or inadequate conditions in the home; and insufficient care or support resulting from death, absence, or physical or mental incapacity of parents.
Detention	The placement of youth in a restrictive facility between referral to court and the first court hearing (Detention Hearing). Also, a youth may be placed in a detention facility at different points as a case progresses through the juvenile justice system.

<u>Glossary</u>

Disposition	Definitive action taken or treatment plan decided on regarding a particular case. (e.g., a course of treatment and rehabilitation).
Disposition Date	The date that the disposition (outcome) or the informal adjustment of each referral took place. This is the date on which all reports produced by TCJFCJ are based.
Informal Adjustment	A non-judicial procedure whereby the juvenile court staff, subject to court approval, makes the decision to attempt to remedy the situation alleged in the referral by giving counsel and advice to the parent(s) and child. This is a voluntary agreement in which no official finding of fact is made. Informal adjustments may be initiated with or without a petition.
Institution	Juvenile correctional or rehabilitation center.
Intake	Intake department first screens referred cases. The intake department may decide to dismiss the case for lack of legal sufficiency or to resolve the matter formally or informally.
Judge	An elected or appointed person/individual presiding over the juvenile court proceedings.
Juvenile	Any individual under the chronological age of eighteen (18) who has not been previously transferred to adult court.
Larceny/Theft	The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession of another.
Motion	Oral or written request before, during, or after court hearings on which a court issues a ruling or order.
Paternity	Determination of who is the father of a child.
Petition	A document filed in a juvenile court alleging that a juvenile is a delinquent or status offender, or on the child's behalf and asking that the court assume jurisdiction over the juvenile, or juvenile's case.
Pretrial Diversion	A procedure similar in nature to informal adjustment, with no official finding as to guilt, except that a judge or referee must approve any agreement.
Probation	Supervision of the child to monitor behavior after finding of guilt.
Referee	An individual, licensed to practice law in Tennessee, who is appointed by the judge to hear cases. A referee has the same authority and powers as the judge to issue process and conduct proceedings.

<u>Glossary</u>

Referral Date	The date the child was referred to the court on the current referral reason/charges.
Referral Source	The agency or individual filing a complaint with intake that initiates court proceedings.
Retired or Nolle Prosequi	When a case is retired after having remained open due to some condition, or the prosecuting attorney makes a formal entry on record that he/she will not prosecute the case further (nolle prosequi means unwilling to pursue).
Review Hearing	Held by the juvenile court to review dispositions and to determine the need to maintain placement in out-of-home care and/or jurisdiction of a child.
Robbery	The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.
Status/Unruly Offenses	Includes acts or types of conduct that are offenses only when committed or engaged in by a juvenile; these can only be adjudicated by a juvenile court.
Termination of Parental Rights	A legal proceeding forever severing all legal rights and obligations of the parent so that others may adopt the child.
Truant	A child who willfully and unjustifiably fails to attend school when attendance is required by law.
Violent Crime Index	Includes homicide, robbery, forcible rape and aggravated assault.
YSO	Youth Services Officer. An official of the court whose duties include, but are not limited to, juvenile court intake, pre-hearing investigations, referral, supervision, detention screenings, counseling, and/or record keeping.
