Tennessee Diploma Options

Regular high school diploma. Alternate academic high school diploma (Special Education).

Diplomas for eligible students receiving special education (These do not count toward the graduation count)

1. Special education high school diploma;

2. Occupational high school diploma.





TENNESSEE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

HIGH SCHOOL POLICY

(7) An occupational diploma may be awarded to students with disabilities at the end of their fourth (4th) year of high school who have (1) not met the requirements for a traditional high school diploma; (2) received special education services or supports and made satisfactory progress on an IEP; (3) have satisfactory records of attendance and conduct; (4) have completed the occupational diploma Skills, Knowledge, and Experience Mastery. Assessment (SKEMA) created by the Tennessee Department of Education; and (5) have completed two (2) years of paid or non-paid work experience. The determination that an occupational diploma is the goal for a student with a disability will be made at the conclusion of the student's tenth (10th) grade year or two (2) academic years prior to the expected graduation date. Students who obtain the occupational diploma may continue to work toward a traditional high school diploma through the end of the school year in which they turn twenty-two (22) yearsold.

(8) Beginning with students entering the ninth (9th) grade in 2018, an alternate academic diploma may be awarded to students with the most significant cognitive disabilities at the end of their fourth (4th) year of high school who have (1) participated in the high school alternate assessments; (2) earned the prescribed twenty-two (22) credit minimum; (3) received special education services or supports and made satisfactory progress on an IEP; (4) have satisfactory records of attendance and conduct; and (5) have completed a transition assessment(s) that measures, at a minimum, postsecondary education and training, employment, independent living, and community involvement. The required credits may be earned either through the state-approved standards or through alternate academic diploma course requirements defined by the Department of Education. A student who earns an alternate academic diploma shall continue to be eligible for special education services under IDEA until the student receives a traditional high school diploma or through the school year in which the student turns twenty-two (22).



"No LEA shall require any enrolling or transferring student, who is in grade eleven (11) or higher and in the custody of the department of children's services or exiting its custody, to meet more than the minimum requirements for graduation set forth by the state board of education. The LEA shall issue a full diploma to any such student who meets the minimum requirements."

Fine Arts: credit

May be waived for students not planning on enrolling in a university to expand and enhance the elective focus.



Foreign Language:

Credits must be in the same foreign language. May be waived by the local school district for students not planning on enrolling in a university to expand and enhance the elective focus. Waiver required.

Elective Focus



Math and Science **Career and Technical Education** Fine Arts Humanities Advanced Placement (AP) / International Baccalaureate (IB) Cambridge International Examinations (CIE)







Beginning with students who enroll in ninth (9th) grade in the 2024-25 school year or any subsequent school year, students will need to earn at least one (1) credit of computer science in high school.

Students may fulfill this requirement by substituting computer science for the student's fourth credit of mathematics, third credit of science, or an elective focus credit. Students who transfer from another state or country, or from a non-public school to a Tennessee high school during their twelfth (12th) grade year are exempt from this requirement.



Credit Transfer Between Schools

Coursework successfully completed in an LEA, public charter school, or Category I, II, or III private school, including coursework completed during a summer school is fully transferrable to any other approved school.



Types of Tennessee High Schools



Alternative High Schools

At least one alternative school or alternative program shall be established and available for students in grades 7-12 who have been suspended or expelled. > Two or more boards may join together and establish a school attended by students of any such school system, or a school system can send a disciplined student to another system's alternative program, provided the other system agrees.





Virtual High Schools

- Virtual schools may be established by a local school district. > A virtual school shall provide each student access to a curriculum that meets or
 - exceeds the academic standards adopted by the state board of education.



T.C.A. § 49-16-204



Public Charter High Schools

"Public charter school" means a public school in this state that is established and operating under the terms of a charter agreement.



DCS Facility Schools

Each DCS facility high school shall adopt graduation requirements aligned with Tennessee State Board of Education Policy.

High school credits should transfer from the facility school to the public high school following step down-- but they often don't-- creating risk for school drop out.

- For students exiting facility schools, check for missing semesters / credits on the transcript.
- DCS Education Consultant can recoup missing credits due to transfer errors.

Students in facility schools should receive special education services in accordance with the State Board of Education Rules, Regulations and Minimum Standards, per the DCS Contract Manual.
