Please list any security measures that you have taken to improve your facilities and/or to protect personnel between **December 1, 2021 and November 30, 2022**.

- (1) We have updated the current security camera system at the Justice Center, including electronic access control; (2) we have equipped the new Juvenile Court courtroom with a bullet-proof bench and a bullet-proof court clerk work area; (3) we have reconstructed the front entrance area into the Justice Center to give court security officers a better view of incoming patrons; and (4) the judges have entered a new order prohibiting the use of portable electronic devices to take photographs, make audio or video recordings or to transmit live audio or video streaming on all floors of the Justice Center without prior written authorization by a judge, and banning other electronic devices from the Justice Center without prior written authorization by a judge.
- (2) The electronic devices order was adopted after the county attorney rendered an opinion that there are numerous federal cases holding that the interior of a courthouse or justice center is not a public forum, and in order to protect the safety and security of litigants, witnesses, jurors, and Blount County Justice Center employees, including but not limited to the use and publication of photographs and/or videos of jurors, victims, and witnesses to intimidate or harass those persons.

Please describe any recent court security incidents in your county or unique court security issues facing your county.

A self-described "First Amendment auditor" has entered the Justice Center with a camera to record activities within the Justice Center and was stopped at the entrance area. He has recorded all interactions with court security personnel and telephone calls to various offices. He has protested the denial of his alleged right to record.



Please explain if and how security staffing issues have impacted court security in your county.

While this is not a "security staffing issue," the use of technology, including video proceedings, has reduced the amount of inmate movement and thus enhanced security.

What are your highest priority needs related to improving court security in your county?

- (1) Equip the new Juvenile Court courtroom with a silent bench panic button;
- (2) Provision of a uniformed guard for the new Juvenile Court courtroom;
- (3) Holding a court security briefing in 2022 for judicial staff and courthouse personnel;
- (4) Installation of cameras or Zoom access to victim-witness rooms so that they may watch courtroom proceedings while in the rooms;
- (5) Secure access for the digital evidence room;
- (6) Secure parking for assistant district attorneys.

*Referring back to question 1, depending on court dockets on any given day, occasionally the Chancery Court and/or the child support referee will meet in a sessions courtroom, or in the jury pool room, to hold court.
