ESTABLISHING STATEWIDE COMMISSION ON
FOSTER CARE

The order entered May 30, 1996, establishing the Statewide Commission on Foster Care is hereby vacated, and the following order is hereby published.

In 1993, as part of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act, Congress authorized federal funding for grants to state court systems to assist them in performing their roles in the continuum of care provided to children and families at risk. The purpose of the program, which is administered through the Administrative Office of the Courts of the Tennessee Supreme Court, is to evaluate how state courts function with respect to cases involving allegations of abuse and neglect and to make improvements.

The Tennessee Supreme Court recognizes the importance of this program and is committed to this state to improve the judicial administration of cases involving abuse, neglect, foster care, and adoption by the courts. The aim of the Court is to achieve a court system in Tennessee that is uniform in its high quality of administration of cases involving allegations of abuse and neglect, and, ultimately, to assist more children alleged to be abused or neglected in achieving permanent homes consistent with their best interests, in an efficient and timely manner.

As part of the Tennessee Supreme Court's State Court Improvement

Program overseeing foster care, the Statewide Commission on Foster Care is

hereby established to assist the Court in the supervision of the assessment phase

of the program, assist in developing a plan of action for improvements, and ensure

that the Tennessee Court Improvement Program reflects the needs, concerns and

interests of courts and related personnel throughout Tennessee. The Commission

will assist the Tennessee Supreme Court and its Administrative Office of the Courts

in the study of how cases involving allegations of abuse and neglect are being

treated by the courts and related personnel throughout the state, including

identification of the extent to which the courts are meeting requirements under state

and federal law. The results of this assessment will provide a basis for the

Commission to assist the Court and its Administrative Office in developing a plan of

action for improving the courts' administration of these cases.

Responsibilities of the Commission will include attendance at three annual

in-state meetings. The Commission will meet periodically to discuss the progress

of the Court Improvement Program, as well as to develop ideas directed toward the

implementation of improvements. Specifically, the Commission will discuss the

review process for children who are in state custody and how well that process

contributes to the dual goals of ensuring that reasonable efforts are made to

preserve families and that children find permanent homes. The Commission will

also study and develop guidelines for foster care review boards.

The Supreme Court is pleased to appoint Betty Adams, Esquire as Chair of

the Statewide Commission on Court Improvement. The organizational meeting will
